

Wildfire Protection

Defensible Space Assistance



Get Defensive. Defensible Space increases the likelihood of your home surviving a wildfire. Properties within the State Responsibility Area (SRA) are required to create and maintain Defensible Space around structures.

Is your property eligible for this service? In the Spring of 2020, assistance will be available to help property owners in Tehama County's SRA create Defensible Space at no cost. This service is for elderly property owners or those who physically and/or financially are unable to provide and/or maintain the mandated Defensible Space. Project work occurs within Zone 1, 100' from structures and may include:

- Thinning and pruning brush
- Trimming tree limbs
- Removing dead branches
- Removing tree limbs
- Mowing 30'-50' from structures.

Community Chipping

Reduce the Fuels, Reduce the Risk. Dispose your tree branches and hazardous vegetation through the Community Chipping program.



Is your property eligible for this service? In the Spring of 2020, assistance will be available to help property owners in select Tehama County SRA's chip hazardous vegetation on-site. Residents will be required to pile limbs following protocol along the roadside by the scheduled Community Chipping Day.
